Rationale and ambition

- To reflect evolving research processes
 - ✓ Digital transition; Iterative and recursive; Collaborative and open
- To reflect increasing demands on research
 - ✓ Societal, environmental, economic challenges; Diversity of outputs
- To move away from inappropriate uses of journal- and publication-based metrics
 - ✓ Rewards quantity and publication venue rather than quality; does not reward sharing, collaboration and outputs other than publications
- To further support the quality of research and the attractiveness of research environments
 - ✓ Requires a system and cultural change, involving institutions, funders and researchers

Common vision

Assessment of research, researchers, and research organisations, **recognises the diverse outputs, practices and activities** that maximise the quality of research and resulting impacts.

This requires basing assessments primarily on **qualitative judgement**, supported by **responsible use of quantitative indicators.**

4 core commitments:

- 1. Recognise the diversity of contributions to, and careers in, research in accordance with the needs and the nature of the research
- 2. Base research assessment primarily on qualitative evaluation for which peer-review is central, supported by responsible use of quantitative indicators
- 3. Abandon inappropriate uses in research assessment of journal- and publication-based metrics, in particular inappropriate uses of Journal Impact Factor (JIF) and h-index
- 4. Avoid the use of rankings of research organisations in research assessment

Expected benefits and challenges

- Commitments for changes and space for mutual learning and collaboration
 - ✓ Previous recommendations and declarations: not successful enough in triggering changes
 - ✓ CoARA supports and facilitates the implementation of the commitments by the members
- Driven by stakeholders
 - ✓ Respects the autonomy of research organisations and allows for differences in implementation
- Critical mass of stakeholders
 - √ To achieve the required system and culture changes
 - ✓ Avoids disadvantage of first mover
 - ✓ Coherence across the various assessment systems (various types of research organisations involved)
- Transition period
 - ✓ May bring some uncertainties for the assessors and those assessed
- Resources needed
 - ✓ More qualitative assessment may require additional resources for peer-review



Role of the European Commission

- Liaison with Member States / Associated Countries
- Facilitate the setting up of national/regional framework conditions

ERA Forum

- Signed the Agreement end of 2022, member of CoARA (as research funder)
- Evolution of assessment practices for EC funding on R&I
- Co-chair CoARA Working Group on "Improving practices in the assessment of research proposals"

- Observer in CoARA Steering Board
- Financial support to the CoARA activities through Horizon Europe
- Synergies with other EU policy initiatives (e.g. ORE, EOSC, Open Science, European Universities Alliances, Researchers)
